

Democracy in play! We've completed our Gingerbread Go! Have you seen him recently? The children listed all their ideas for the design, then voted on their preferred topic 'stationery.' This theme, along with the poet Michael Rosen, provided inspiration.

The Romans are here! Learning about words such as dictator, chief and tribe – we have studied the Romans' invasion of Britain. We discussed the differences between Britain and nearby European countries in 55BC. A fun game of hot-seating' allowed the children to play the part of Julius Caesar as they interviewed the army general.

A stormy invasion...

When Caesar came to Britain, he <u>wasn't</u> <u>prepared</u> for the British <u>weather</u>. He was born near the <u>Mediterranean Sea</u>, which is mostly calm and only has a small change in tides. When he arrived in the English Channel the <u>storms</u> and <u>high tides</u> battered his ships.

Another problem was that Caesar's ships were <u>big</u> and <u>heavy</u>. They had to anchor in <u>deep water</u> away from the shoreline.

What is the Roman soldier doing in this picture? . How do you think he felt?








