Taking risks

Forest School teaches children about risks and how to evaluate them. Activities such as lighting and cooking over an open fire, using a saw to cut wood and climbing trees are introduced when the children in the group are ready for them. These activities are led or supervised by an adult. As children become more confident in measuring risks, they learn to make sensible choices, knowing that they are responsible for themselves, their choices and actions. All activities in a Forest School session are for a purpose, eg: cutting wood to create a rope ladder.

Who runs Forest School?

Davies (a teacher and a qualified Level
3 practitioner) and supported by two
assistants. All staff are permanent
members of school staff and are DBS
checked. New assistants will undergo
training with L Davies to ensure
understanding of the concepts of
Forest School and to ensure continuity
of practice, communication,
safeguarding, professionalism and
confidence.



What do we do?



There are lots of different games and activities including cooking over an open fire, using tools, making dens, leaving trails, going on scavenger hunts, making environmental art and working in teams and independently.
